

E♭ ALTO SAXOPHONE TRILL FINGERING CHART

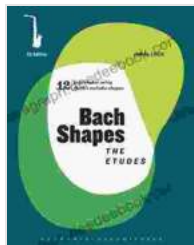
Move the red key rapidly to produce the trill.

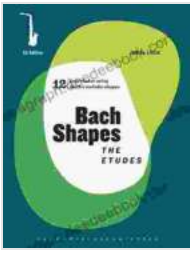

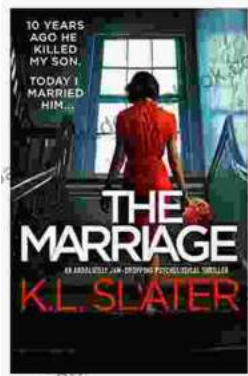
