

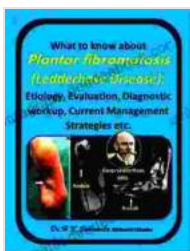
Plantar Fibromatosis: An In-Depth Guide to Ledderhose Disease

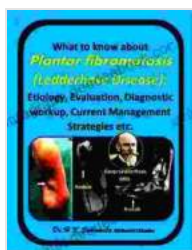
